





Depicted in this ink drawing is the rendering of species being drawn to natural light, through the phenomenon of transverse orientation. A natural progression of creatures and natural forms synergizing and adapting to manmade interventions. Their coexistence gives rise to a transformative shift titled Where to now my beloved II. It is a diptych that reflects the foliage of the ocean and mollusk shelter from which emerge two fishes reflective of the story of Noah's ark making their way into a fluid future. A visual journey of the formation of a desert, as the ocean makes way to a more barren scape seen in the gradual progression from one panel to the other. The second panel with predominantly manmade elements like the observatory, submarine helmet and other elements all reflective of our current epoch. This artwork is part of a larger series with the same title, that follows species that adapt to diverse environments and is an ode to their strength and resilience.

Ravi Chaurasyia's artistic interest engages with geographical form, environmental crises, and natural resource (animal and human) ecological systems located in a landscape context. Living in an endangered situation, irrespective of history and culture, may lead to an inevitable end. Therefore, Ravi's work underlines the consequences of human actions and architectural waste that have primarily treated ecology and the environment as a means to achieve capitalist ends, furthering infrastructural development at the cost of nature.

Ravi conceptually creates several visualizations representing various dimensions of these above-stated concerns through different artistic mediums. He attempts to expand these visualizations and conceptual concerns in most of the images on panels, installations, drawings, and paintings.

In his work, there is an attempt to expand his artistic and thematic concerns through the use of different mediums. Most of his work is mixed media. In addition to experimenting with lighting to create effects or using various materials and their juxtapositions, he consistently tries to add more nuanced layers to the meanings in his works.

"Lineage" is a sculptural work composed of three individual pieces, each derived from an amalgamation of eight Venus figurines. Utilizing materials such as dental stone and red oxide, the work reinterprets these ancient symbols of femininity through a contemporary lens. The Fibonacci proportions employed in the sculptures introduce a sense of natural harmony, suggesting a universal and timeless essence of the female form. It explores themes of body autonomy and female agency, drawing a parallel between historical and contemporary perceptions of women's bodies. The figurines address a continuum of care and nurturing inherent in female agency, emphasizing how historical narratives have consistently included elements of female empowerment, despite society's ongoing struggle to acknowledge and embrace these aspects. By bridging historical context with present-day issues, the work attempts to celebrate and accept our bodies, challenging the restrictive social constructs that shape body image and self-worth. The sculptures serve as a commentary on the evolving perceptions of femininity, advocating for a more inclusive and empowering understanding that celebrates the female form as a symbol of strength, resilience, and continuity.


